THE U.S. COAST GUARD is one of the five armed forces of the United States and the only military organization within the Department of Homeland Security. Since 1790 the Coast Guard has safeguarded our Nation's maritime interests and environment around the world. The Coast Guard is an adaptable, responsive military force of maritime professionals whose broad legal authorities, capable assets, geographic diversity and expansive partnerships provide a persistent presence along our rivers, in the ports, littoral regions and on the high seas. Coast Guard presence and impact is local, regional, national and international. These attributes make the Coast Guard a unique instrument of maritime safety, security and environmental stewardship.



Last year, more than 41,000 active duty members, 8,000 reservists, 8,600 civilian employees and 30,000 volunteer auxiliaries:

Responded to 17,721 Search and Rescue cases and saved 3,263 lives and more than \$44 million in property.

Removed 88.4 metric tons of cocaine bound toward the U.S.

Continued the deployment of six Patrol Boats and 400 personnel to protect Iraqi critical maritime oil infrastructure and train Iraqi naval forces.

Conducted 564 escorts and patrols to support 155 domestic U.S. military cargo out-loads.

Conducted 23,701 container inspections, 3,712 facility safety and marine pollution related inspections, to ensure safety and environmental stewardship of the maritime domain.

Conducted over 9,500 Port State Control safety and environmental exams on foreign vessels entering U.S. ports.

Screened over 212,000 vessels, including over 126,000 commercial vessels and 30 million crewmembers and passengers prior to arrival in U.S. ports.

Conducted over 50,000 recreational vessel boardings, issued over 9,800 citations, and visited 1,150 recreational boat manufacturers in conjunction with state efforts to provide education and ensure compliance with federal regulations.

Conducted over 5,100 fisheries conservation boardings.

Conducted 5,079 investigations for reportable Marine Casualty involving commercial vessels.

Facilitated with the Canadian Coast Guard, the safe movement of 30 million tons of dry bulk and 7,960,000 barrels of liquid fuel cargoes during the ice season.

Conducted 618 security boardings of High Interest Vessels bound for the United States.

Investigated and responded to over 11,146 pollution incident notifications.

Interdicted more than 2,000 undocumented migrants attempting to illegally enter the United States.
