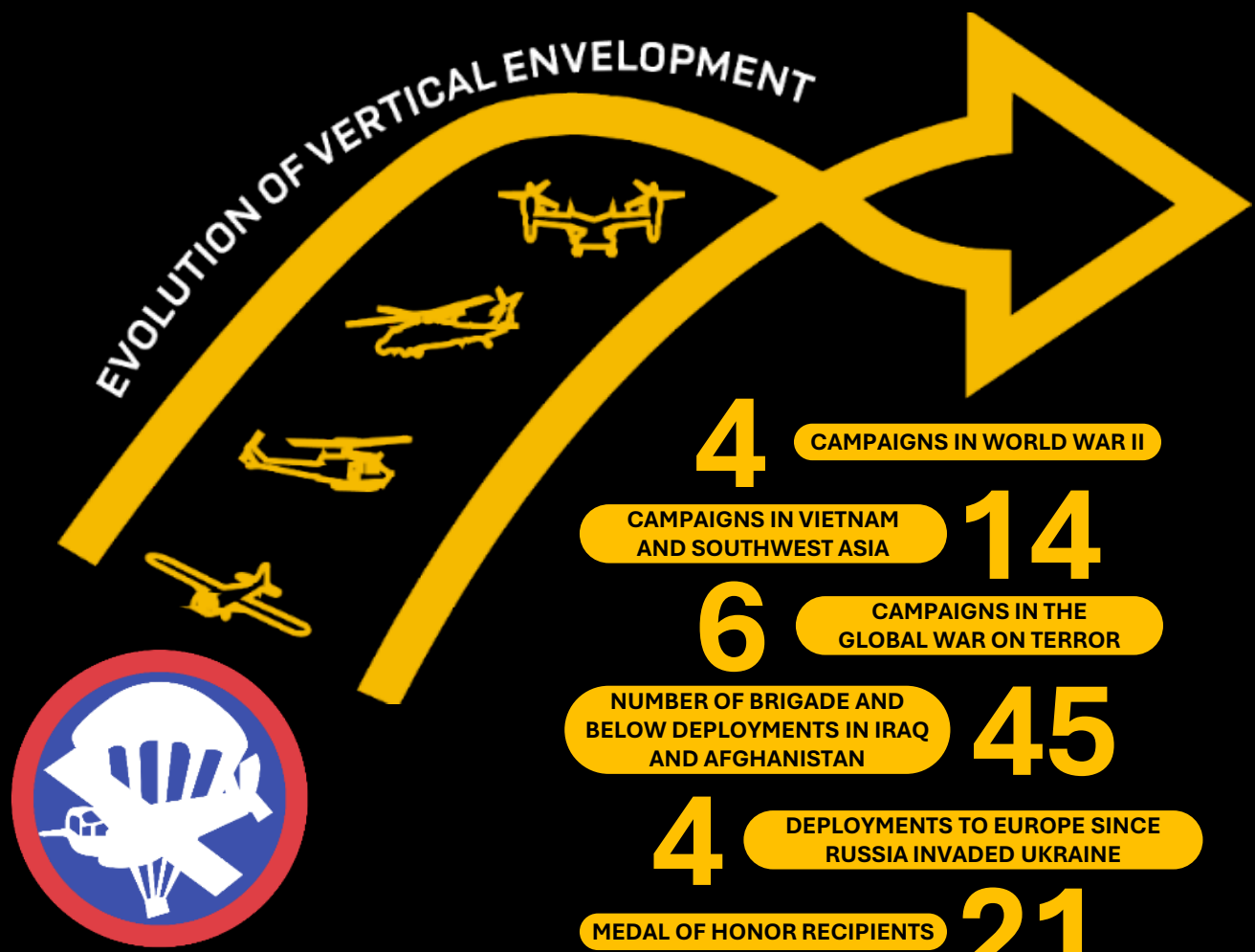

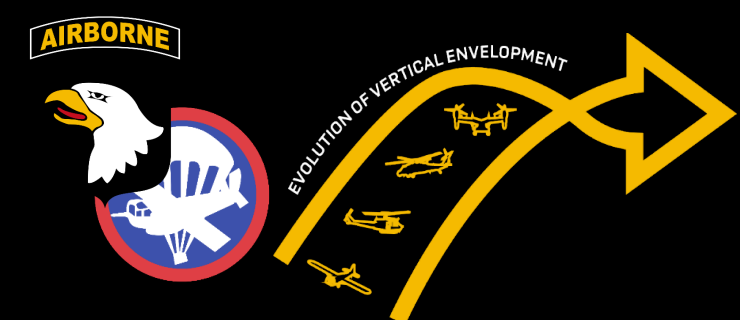

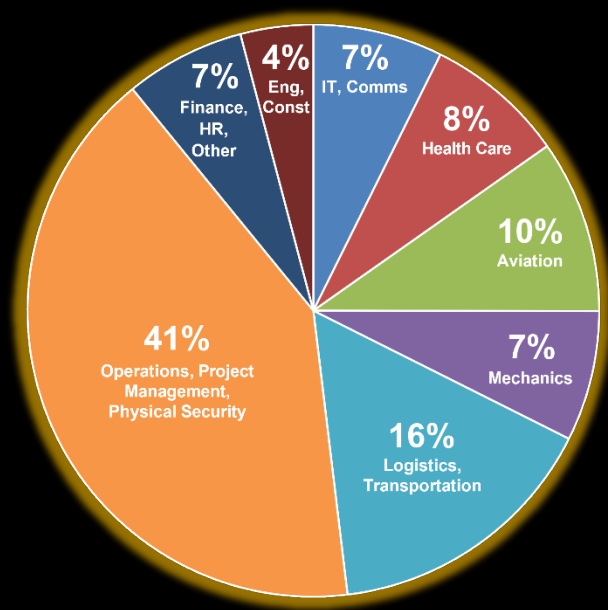
Economic Impact

\$10.1B annual impact to TN

82% of 235,000 are TN Residents
 ~35% of Transitioning Soldiers stay local

Annual Spending
 > \$274M in operational costs
 > \$128M in contracts
 > \$38M in utilities
 ***majority of this spending goes back into local community

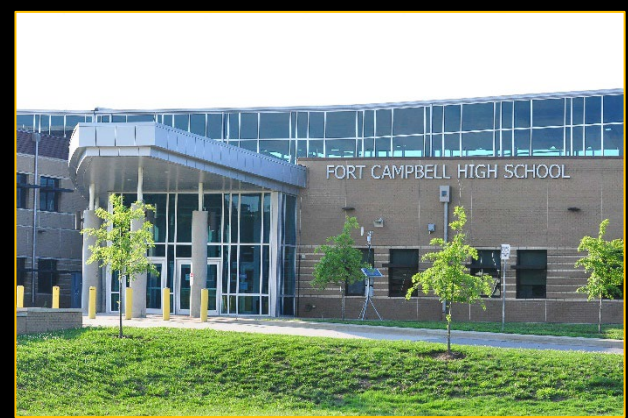
