

U.S. Army Cadet Command partners with universities to recruit, educate, develop & inspire Senior ROTC Cadets in order to commission Officers of character for the Total Army; and partners with high schools to conduct Junior ROTC to develop citizens of character for a lifetime of commitment and service to our Nation.

The implementing authority for ROTC is Title 10, U.S.C, Chapter 103 – ROTC was created by the National Defense Act of 1916. Cadet Command consists of 7 regionally aligned Brigades and 1 Military College Brigade that oversees Junior & Senior Military Colleges.

- Over 280,000 Cadets at over 1,740 High Schools
- Nationally Accredited Program of Instruction
- 3rd Largest Youth Program in the U.S. (Scouts BSA & 4-H)
- POI includes Civics, Ethics, Health/Wellness, History and Leadership
- 180-hour High School Elective
- Co-curricular: Air Rifle, Archery, Drill, Drones, Fitness, JLAB, Robotics, Cyber



SENIOR ROTC

- 28,500 Cadets at ~ 910 Colleges & Universities
- Over 701,000 Alumni since 1916
- Largest Grantor of Merit Based Scholarships
- Open to Undergraduate & Graduate Students
- Full Program: 216 Lessons (Includes Leadership Labs & 2 FTXs per year)
- Commissions ~ 76% of 2LTs for both the Active and Reserve Components
