

1 x Defense Support to Civil Authority Exercise each year. (CAMP ATTERBURY)

2 x USAR-Wide Planning Work Groups each year (100+ attendees) 3 x 84th TC General Officer events (6 + General Officers and 50+ supporting attendees) 6-8 Observer Coach Trainer Classes per year (40-60 Students each)6-8 Senior Gunner Courses each year (20-30 Students each)2-4 Brigade or Higher HQs exercises per year (100+ personnel each)

84th TC Summary and Observations of Trends



84th Training Command Summary

- >Responsible for planning, resourcing, managing, and executing major exercises for all Army Reserve units
- > Executes nine multi-echelon exercises replicating Large Scale Combat Operations in four separate locations per year
- > Trains more brigades per year than all the Combat Training Centers
- > Subordinate units located across the U.S.
- > Performs these missions with 3,300 Reserve Soldiers, 296 Active-duty Soldiers, 125 civilians, and 110 contractors
- > Conducts internal education program training over 400 Observer/Coach-trainers and Senior Gunners
- > Executes 5 live fire events per year (including 1 for forces in Korea)
- > Conducts the External Evaluation for Combined Forces Headquarters Korea twice a year

Potential Trends reference Soldiers' thinking about Kentucky

- > We have seen an increase in Soldiers hesitant to come to Kentucky in the last several years. Anecdotally:
 - Perception of poor performing schools
 - Perception of few amenities, attractions, recreation opportunities
 - Perception of low multi-cultural tolerance; limited diversity
 - Perception that KY = rural living with limited cosmopolitan options
- > Noted an increase in Soldiers and Civilians choosing to live in Southern Indiana due to cost of living
- Increased dispersion of addresses from Radcliff, Elizabethtown, and Meade County (18-20 miles) to Louisville and Bardstown (30-40 miles), Southern Indiana (40-50 miles), Shelbyville (60 miles), etc. due to a lack of affordable available housing
- > Enhanced HWY 44 and other for direct access to Fort Knox without using HWY 265 or HWY 31 to I-65 and beyond
- Enhanced promotion and advertisement of successful schools, enduring amenities and attractions, acceptance and tolerance, and that KY offers the best combination of small town and metropolitan feel
